

# Crossing the River

1 I step off the plane and into a world of Chinese faces. All the signs are in Chinese, and I look around the airport through **fatigued** eyes for English notices. “**Holders** of passports from other countries.” I step into the line.

Chris meets me holding a sign with my name and a cartoon of a teacher. After two months of **swapping** emails with him, I am glad to be able to put a face to his name. He tells me the hotel is in a nice place. In fact, it is a **congested** building on a **bustling** street, but the river beside it looks interesting.

15 After my long flight, I really want to sleep, but Chris wants to show me how to use the underground trains. I know I need to learn how as soon as possible, so over the river we go, across a large bridge with red **railings**. Chris says the river is called Bi Tan, which means “blue water” in Chinese. But in this early spring, everything looks gray, **including** Bi Tan.

- I look down from the bridge and see lots of little boats **moored** in **neat** rows along the river banks.
- 25 They **remind** me of the river boats at home, and yet they are completely different. These boats look like swans. They have long necks and swan heads, eyes and wings.
- 30 The next day, the boats are all over the river. People are having a good time on Bi Tan. They **paddle** the swan boats up and down and **sideways** on the water. The bridge **rocks** under a thousand footsteps. I cross it several times that day and the next, taking videos and catching the underground train to nowhere in **particular**. I do some shopping. Slowly, I begin to feel more familiar with life in Taipei.

- 40 The swan boats somehow help me **connect** my life in South Africa with my new, foreign home. I think of them again when I start my job as an English teacher and my **pupils** sing for me. The children have little understanding of what they are singing, but the feeling is good. They
- 45 sing: “Row, row, row your boat, gently down the stream; **merrily**, merrily, merrily, merrily, life is but a dream!”

**bustling** *adj.* busy; full of activity.

**congested** *adj.* stuffed; packed; crowded.

Cars moved slowly through the congested streets.

**connect** *v.* to join two or more things together; to form an association between two or more things.

Mary connects the smell of cinnamon with memories of her grandmother's house.

**fatigued** *adj.* tired; weary. Michael was fatigued from his all-night study session.

**holder** *n.* someone who is in possession of something.

The season's ticket holders were assigned the best seats in the stadium.

**include** *v.* to make something or someone part of a group.

The list of ingredients includes onions and celery.

**merrily** *adv.* gladly; happily; joyfully.

Because she likes her work, Amanda merrily does her job.

**moor** *v.* to anchor; to tie up.

Before the windstorm struck, the pilot moored his small airplane to the field.

**neat** *adj.* tidy; systematic; orderly; formal.

David is very well groomed; his hair always looks neat.

**paddle** *v.* to propel a watercraft; to row.

The boys paddled the boat to their favorite fishing spot.

**particular** *adj.* specific, worth noting.

Anna has no particular objection to going to the French restaurant.

**pupil** *n.* student; trainee. Edward has enrolled as a pupil at the new business school.

**railing** *n.* banister; upper, longitudinal part of a balustrade.

Sarah was afraid that she would slip on the wet steps, so she held the railing tightly.

**remind** *v.* to cause someone to think of someone or something.

Remind me to buy milk this afternoon.

**rock** *v.* to move back and forth or from side to side; to sway; to bounce.

So many people were dancing that the disco floor rocked.

**sideways** *adv.* to the side; laterally; crosswise.

Thomas squeezed sideways through the narrow opening in the fence.

**swap** *v.* to trade; to exchange. When Diane and Jennifer get tired of their wardrobes, they sometimes swap clothes.
